Primary enrolment rates for both boys and girls are low in Turkana and other pastoralist districts, typically 20-30%. This is unsurprising, since state schools are static while herders are mobile; and the formal curriculum has little relevance to the lives of herders, except in matters on which they have to deal with government or NGOs. Of the minority of children who attend school, girls are many fewer than boys.
